Having completed one major project we now turn our attention to a new piece of construction work on the school site. The Local Authority is adding an additional KS1 class to the Middleton community which will see us welcome eight new pupils to the school in the Summer term of 2023. Although disruption for the pupils during this construction period will be minimal, there will be a significant impact upon our car park area and capacity. Parents who transport their child to school have been advised as to an amended routine over the coming weeks. Please be aware that if you visit the school during the day, car parking facilities will be limited. I will keep you updated as to the exciting developments that occur over the coming weeks.

## Reading Books For Home

This week your child will have received a formal reading book or activity to share with the family at home. We hope that this will allow you to spend some quality time with your child sharing a book together which they have the capacity to read and enjoy. Please bear in mind that your child's reading ability is led not only by decoding the print on the

page, but also by the level of comprehension and discussion that the reading also generates. Perhaps you could work on their recall, or prediction skills alongside blending sounds to read the words.

## Aftendance

Over the Autumn term we experienced lower than average pupil attendance in school. This is understandable to some degree as there was a nasty spell of illness throughout the school in the run up to Christmas. It still remains that if your child is unwell then remaining at home is the sensible course of action. However, I would like to take this opportunity to remind families that the school day starts at 8.50am (9.00 for parent drop off). Pupils must be registered as in attendance within ten minutes of this time. On occasions there are extenuating circumstances which delay a pupil in arriving at school on time, but the legal expectation is that pupils

will be in school in time for morning registration. Attendance in school is not optional for any pupils and all absences are reportable to both the local authority and the DFE. Please also bear in mind that we plan term dates to allow for a week's holiday from the 3<sup>rd</sup> to 11th June so that families may enjoy some time together when resorts are less busy. We ask that you book holidays within school holiday dates or in this specified week. If a child misses a morning session due to an appointment please can we ask families to try to return them to school either before twelve or after one o clock as both pupils and staff are taking a lunch break at this time and it can be challenging to reintegrate.

If you would like some help and support with attendance then please do contact the school as we would be happy to support individual families with strategies where it would be helpful.
